POLITICAL PARTICIPATION IN CHINA

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Executive Summary

- 1. Political participation is about how ordinary citizens influence political decision-making and policy implementation.
- 2. In addition to state-sponsored elections, Chinese citizens have various means of participation, ranging from engaging leaders, writing to the government and to the media, to submitting petitions and mobilising collective protests.
- 3. Three waves of public opinion surveys find that the majority of Chinese citizens have been involved in political participation. Nevertheless, only a small proportion has engaged in more than one type of participation.
- 4. Collective protests have been on the rise. A few resemble what has been characterised as social movements.
- 5. However, Chinese citizens' political participation and protests are still limited to the pursuit of personal and particular interests, instead of civic and political rights.
- 6. Many local governments have been promoting "deliberative democracy", by selectively and limitedly allowing citizens to participate in certain policy discussions and evaluations.
- 7. To address rising demands of participation and protests, the Chinese government has established a comprehensive system of "maintaining social stability".
- 8. Methods to maintain social stability have become increasingly more diverse, ranging from traditional coercions, to flexible and non-coercive means.
- 9. Beijing will face increasing pressure to improve channels of political participation in order to satisfy rising demands of the citizens.
