THE CHINA FACTOR IN JAPAN'S RISING INTEREST IN INDIA

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Executive Summary

- 1. Japan is now seeking a strategic alignment with India to balance a rising China.
- 2. Prime Minister Abe Shinzo perceives India as a nation that, unlike China, shares common political values and strategic interests with Japan. Abe enthusiastically advocates "a stronger Japan for a stronger India, and a stronger India for a stronger Japan."
- Though flattered by Tokyo's new found attention, New Delhi is cognizant of Japan's limited economic interest in India despite the buoyant Indian economy.
- 4. India seeks greater Japanese investment and ODA (Official Development Assistance) in key infrastructural and industrial development --- sectors in which Japan has been contributing to China for decades.
- 5. Even though Japan severely criticized India for its nuclear tests in 1998, they are now members of the G 4 (along with Germany and Brazil) who are jointly pursuing permanent membership in the United Nations Security Council --- a symbol of great power in the international system.
- 6. Despite warming Indo-Japanese relations, New Delhi is unlikely to forge a strategic alliance with Tokyo against Beijing.
- 7. Furthermore, India perceives itself as a regional great power with its own strategic considerations and will not necessarily lock in on the agenda of other great powers (including Japan) against China.
